As many of you know, after serving 18 years as our artistic director, Scott Allen Jarrett decided this past summer not to accept a new contract. The Chorale has bid Scott a grateful farewell for the inspirational artistic leadership he provided for many years, and we wish him well in his future endeavors. Susanne Powers, our Executive Director, has recruited three talented choral conductors to lead the four concerts that comprise our 2022–23 season. The first of these is Jonathan Mott who curated and conducted our fall concert and leads us again this weekend. We are excited to have also engaged two additional conductors who are well known in the greater New England choral community. Emily Isaacson



will curate and conduct our concert on March 11 at Emmanuel Church, and Anthony Trecek-King will conduct Handel's Israel in Egypt on May 12 at Sanders Theatre.

A search committee, chaired by Board member Jim Farmer, has been formed to identify a permanent new Music Director of the Back Bay Chorale. Jim's committee will cast a wide net to identify four finalist candidates for this position, each of whom will curate and conduct the concerts that comprise our 2023–24 season, with our new Music Director being appointed in June 2024. We invite our audience to enjoy what promises to be an exciting lineup of talented conductors who will lead the Back Bay Chorale in concerts over the next 20 months. The first regular concert season (2024–25) led by our new permanent Music Director will celebrate the 50th anniversary of Back Bay Chorale.

The Bridges community engagement mission of the Back Bay Chorale continues to thrive under the leadership of newly appointed community engagement coordinator, Corey Hart, tenor. Corey leads a Bridges chorus comprised of about 20 students of English Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) plus several regular Chorale singers in weekly rehearsals held at the main branch of the Boston Public Library. Our Bridges ESOL chorus recently performed at the Boston Public Library Fund's annual donor appreciation celebration and will also perform for you during our two Christmas concerts. In addition, a group of about 25 chorale members continue to perform at Naturalization Ceremonies for new U.S. citizens in several historic Boston area venues, including Faneuil Hall, and the JFK Library, and free public concerts at the Boston Public Library.

Thank you for joining us for today's concert. We look forward to again welcoming you, our loyal audience, to future concerts featuring a range of well-known choral classics as well as contemporary works, leading to the selection of our new permanent music director.

Emily Isaacson, Guest Conductor

Dr. Emily Isaacson is a conductor fiercely committed to reimagining classical music for today's audience. She is founder and artistic director of Classical Uprising, a performing arts collective that believes classical music must rise up, challenge current norms, and re-envision where, how, and for whom we are making music.

One of only a handful of female conductors (and morns) in the country, Isaacson was named the 2018 Maine Artist of the Year by the Maine Arts Commission, one of 50 Mainers Leading



the State by Maine Magazine, and the 2018 face of Maine's Women's Work.

In 2008 Isaacson helped to launch Roomful of Teeth, a GRAMMY*winning new vocal music ensemble, and in 2015 and 2018 (2022 pending) was a winner of the American Prize in Conducting.

She has taught at Clark University, Bowdoin College, and the University of Illinois. A St. Andrews Society Scholar, Isaacson holds a master's degree in musicology from the University of Edinburgh, Scotland; a master's degree in conducting from the University of Oregon; and a doctorate in conducting from the University of Illinois.

Anthony Tecek-King, Guest Conductor

Over the past 20 years, Dr. Anthony Trecek-King has cultivated an international reputation as a choral conductor, scholar, pedagogue, and media personality.

Trecek-King is passionate about cultivating artistically excellent ensembles that explore socially relevant issues through emotionally immersive programs, challenging both artists and audiences to feel and think. Dr. Trecek-King has recently been appointed as both an Associate Professor of Choral Music and Director of Choral Activities at The Hartt School, University of Hartford and a Resident Conductor with the Handel and Haydn Society.

Ensembles under his direction were integral to projects that have won a Pulitzer Prize® (Madam White Snake, Zhou Long), received a Grammy® (Fantastic Mr. Fox, Boston Modern Orchestra Project), and earned the National Arts and Humanities Youth Program Award from Presidential Committee on the Arts (Boston Children's



Chorus). Dr. Trecek-King has worked with a variety of artists and ensembles including Leslie Odom Jr., Melinda Doolittle, the San Francisco Symphony Chorus, Seraphic Fire, Keith Lockhart, John Williams, Gil Rose, Simon Halsey, Yo Yo Ma, and Roomful of Teeth. He has led performances in world-renowned venues including Boston Symphony Hall, the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C., Carnegie Hall in New York City, Royal Albert Hall in London, and the Sydney Opera House. He is the host of the classical radio show "The Silent Canon" which airs on KNVO 90.7.

JONATHAN MOTT GUEST CONDUCTOR

NSPIRED BY AN ENDLESS FASCINATION OF WHAT makes music, music, Jonathan Mott has established himself in the Boston area as a conductor of great versatility and compelling musicianship.

Jonathan is the Resident Conductor and Teaching Assistant of the Harvard-Radcliffe Collegium Musicum, a post he has held since the fall of 2017. Since arriving at Harvard, Jonathan has led Collegium in concerts in New York City and Cape Town, South Africa, and prepared the chorus for a 2018 performance of Arthur Honegger's Jeanne d'Arc au Bûcher with Odyssey Opera. Most recently, he conducted the group in their 50th anniversary performance of Claudio Monteverdi's Vespers of 1610. Day to day, Jonathan serves as an adviser for the student-led administration of the chorus though he has also worked closely with Dr. Robert Kyr in mentoring student composers through the Harvard Composers New Music Initiative, conducting several world premiere performances of their works.

As the former Assistant Conductor of the Back Bay Chorale, Jonathan assisted in preparing over thirteen major works for the group's main stage performances and conducted the Chorale's March 2017 concert, "Essential Voices: Da Pacem." He also served as the artistic lead for the Chorale's Bridges outreach efforts, sharing music at places such as the Women's Lunch Place, Standish Village, and Goddard House.

Jonathan has served as Music Director – Choir at University Lutheran Church in Harvard Square



since 2014, where he conducts the choir and often composes anthems in his signature style: two-anda-half minutes long using two lines of text.

Jonathan holds a master's degree in choral conducting from Boston University where he studied with Scott Allen Jarrett, David Hoose, and George Case. He also holds a bachelor's degree in music from Boston College where he studied composition with Thomas Oboe Lee and Ralf Gawlick, and conducting with John Finney. In his free time, Jonathan can be found birding in the forests and fields of New England, in search of the latest rare bird.



HELIOS BRASS QUINTET

elios Brass Quintet is a Boston-based ensemble of young professionals who are dedicated to exploring and performing the rich repertoire of brass chamber music at the highest artistic level. Helios Brass features David O'Neill and Jake Baldwin (trumpets), Paolo Rosselli (french horn), Zachary Johnson (trombone) and Roger Dahlin (tuba). Equally passionate about performing works from the Renaissance as they are exploring new sound ideas in contemporary works, the ensemble brings brass chamber music to their audiences with an engaging freshness. The quintet has recently been featured at the beautiful Jordan Hall, but their concerts are not always limited to the traditional concert hall, as they also enjoy connecting with audiences outside the traditional setting.



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JUSTIN THOMAS BLACKWELL ORGAN

ustin Thomas Blackwell is the associate director of music at Marsh Chapel, Boston University, and is principal organist for the Chapel's Sunday morning service, broadcast weekly on WBUR 90.9 FM, National Public Radio. He performs regularly with the Handel and Haydn Society and is in frequent demand as a continuo keyboardist, and has played organ or harpsichord for the four major choral/ orchestral works of J. S. Bach (the two passions, the Mass in B minor, Christmas Oratorio), four oratorios of G. F. Handel, Monteverdi's Vespers of 1610, and more than thirty-five Bach cantatas. As a pianist, he can be heard on Miami-based Seraphic



Fire's Grammy Award®-nominated recording of Brahms's Ein deutsches Requiem.

HENRY WEINBERGER REHEARSAL PIANIST

ENRY WEINBERGER HAS ACCOMPANIED singers, instrumentalists, and choruses in concerts and recitals in the Boston area for many years. This is his fourteenth year as rehearsal pianist for the Back Bay Chorale. Former positions include accompanying the MIT Chorus under the direction of Bill Cutter, and working with Betsy Burleigh and the Master Singers of Lexington. Weinberger received a Master of Music in Piano Performance at the New England Conservatory, where he studied with Leonard Shure and Lorna Cooke DeVaron. His other principal teachers were Victor Rosenbaum at Brandeis University and John Moriarty, with whom he studied operatic repertoire and under whom he worked as staff accompanist at the Boston Conservatory of Music and assistant conductor at Central City Opera in Colorado.

Weinberger has played rehearsals under the batons of Seiji Ozawa, Arthur Fiedler, and Kurt Masur, among others. He also performed with the Boston Pops under the direction of John Williams and played one of the piano parts of Carl Orff's Carmina Burana at Carnegie Hall. He has served on the faculty of the



Longy School in Cambridge, where he was the music director of the opera department and taught classes in vocal repertoire and diction for singers. Weinberger made a career change in 1989, when he ecome a nurse. He worked at Harvard Vanguard Medical Associates for twenty-four years, where he specialized in the care of people with HIV, hepatitis C, and other infectious diseases.
